Greetings from CIPE,

As we head into some time off, let me wish all of you a well-deserved break. Whether you're staying on campus or heading off somewhere, do take some time for yourself to relax and recharge.

For some of you, the break may provide a little time for reflection about plans after the end of the semester. If you are thinking about your summer plans or deciding between multiple options, how should you make that decision? The first thing to point out is you don't need to get caught up in the pressure of what *The Octant* recently called the summer frenzy. It is perfectly all right to decide that what you need is downtime with family and friends, to read books, to spend time outdoors, to think.

Summer though can be a time where you add to your repertoire of skills and knowledge. Does the opportunity you are considering let you learn something new, or get better at something you already know how to do? Does it introduce you to people from whom you can learn or be mentored? And even, does it help you decide you aren't interested in something you thought you were – that can be just as valuable.

This issue of skills is one that has come up in several contexts this week. Students thinking ahead to jobs have wondered whether they are at a disadvantage compared with peers at other institutions whose degrees are more obviously vocational. And we have had conversations about skills in some meetings with majors. Our message is this: throughout your undergraduate years, it is a good idea to build your skills, networks and list of accolades. Whatever you decide to do later, this is a useful strategy.

Skill building may happen in the classroom; for example you might take a class on GIS mapping, or learn to do info-graphics for a final course project or select a course like Accounting at NUS. Some skills you can and should acquire on your own, such as learning

Excel via an online course through Lynda.com. Summer activities provide many ways to build skills but don't think of that as a one-off opportunity; find ways to deepen your skills over time. You may take a foreign language in the summer, continue studying it as a class or via Mango, and spend a study abroad semester in the country where the language is spoken. Your extra-curricular and club activities provide the chance to build skills like project management or event planning. And don't forget that there are many people in the Yale-NUS community like staff members or faculty and their partners associated with the residential colleges who have professional expertise and can help you develop a skill you feel you need; if you want to, say, learn to write a press release, you can ask the Public Affairs office or community members who have worked as journalists for help.

So one way to think about potential summer opportunities is to ask: what skills do I want to learn or improve and will this opportunity allow me to do that? Because we are interested in skill development, we have just introduced a new internship that focuses on that. It is a team consulting project in Thailand that focuses on sustainability and cultural heritage at a royal summer palace on the coast. It emphasizes working in teams, applied historical and environmental research and client report writing. If you're interested, search in Symplicity for 'Cultural heritage as sustainable development.'

Why do we say that accolades are important? Of course it is a good resume builder to have external awards listed but more importantly, participating in competitions is a wonderful way to hone your skills, build your networks, deepen your understanding of a problem and very often, to have a concrete impact on the world. There are a number of competitions that are coming up and we encourage you to apply. Below you'll find links to the Young CSR Leaders award and to a competition where you can submit a 45 second video on how companies can create more LGBT-inclusive workplaces. Singapore's Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) has also issued a <u>call</u> for ideas on pop-up projects to enliven public spaces. This is your chance to be very creative around an issue about which you're passionate.

Have a great break. If you happen to be on campus do consider attending the lunch with Dr, Yolanda Moses, a distinguished professor of Anthropology who will lead a discussion on diversity and inclusion in the workplace in Singapore. For those of you who will be away, we look forward to seeing you after break.
